





Maintain the character and integrity of existing San Antonio neighborhoods, parks, open space and trails by focusing growth in mixed-use regional centers and along attractive multimodal corridors with high performing transit service.

Ensure that all residents living in existing and new neighborhoods have safe and convenient access to jobs, housing, and a variety of amenities and basic services including great parks, strong schools, convenient shopping and nearby regional centers.





Connect safe and stable mixedincome neighborhoods with a system of walkable and bikeable streets, trails and pathways that celebrate and link natural greenways and drainage ways.

Ensure an inclusive San Antonio by providing affordable housing and transportation choices throughout the city. Encourage a variety of amenityrich places throughout the city with a balance of live, work and play opportunities.



Conserve, protect and manage San Antonio's natural, cultural and historic resources and open space.

Encourage and integrate innovative and sustainable ideas and development.

Provide an ongoing planning framework for more detailed and timely planning and design of regional centers, corridors and neighborhoods with continued opportunities for participation and partnerships, prioritization, and performance measurement.

Provide the residents of San Antonio, including youth, seniors, and disabled populations, with enhanced levels of authentic engagement.





What is a Sub-Area Plan?

- Developed to implement the City's SA Tomorrow Comprehensive Plan that was adopted in 2016
- Sub-Area plans provide a greater level of detail for a specific area and allow stakeholders the opportunity to give input for their part of the City
- 30 Sub-Areas that together cover all of San Antonio - Developed six at a time over five phases



Land Use

A key goal of the SA Tomorrow Comprehensive Plan is creating a land use map for the entire city that reflects the community's desired pattern of development



Mobility

This section discusses strategies and improvements that could improve getting around in the area



Housing

This section complements the Land Use section with specific strategies for housing in the area



Amenities & Public Space

This section discusses future projects and policies for creating places where people have access to basic infrastructure, the outdoors, and cultural assets



Economic Development

This section describes specific strategies for supporting businesses and connecting people to jobs

Why Sub-Area Plans?

- Effective and equitable planning for the entire city. For neighborhoods, we recognize that we need to plan for three types of areas:
 - 1. Registered neighborhoods that are within an adopted plan
 - 2. Registered neighborhoods that are not within any adopted plan
 - 3. Neighborhoods that are not part of a registered association or within an adopted plan area
- Create a comprehensive and consistent land use map for the entire city.

Sub-Area Plans

Sub-Area Plans are intended to provide a more coordinated, efficient and effective structure for neighborhood planning. Existing and future neighborhood planning will be integrated into the planning for regional centers and community planning areas. Neighborhoods will become integral sub-geographies of these sub-areas while also receiving special attention through chapters and/or sections reflecting specific opportunities, challenges, recommendations and priorities from each participating neighborhood. Neighborhood and community plans should be respected, as appropriate, as they are integrated into the sub-area plans. Following are the three categories of Sub-Area Plans which include: Regional Center Plans; Corridor Plans; and Community Plans.

RECOMMENDATION – M 1

Prioritize safe mobility for all.

STRATEGY - M 1.1

Continue implementation of Vision Zero strategies (reduced speeds, narrow lanes, safer crossings, etc.) for key areas of conflicts between people driving, people walking and people bicycling.

STRATEGY - M 1.2

Improve safety and reduce delays at railroad crossings.

STRATEGY - M 1.3

Eliminate low water crossings as roads are reconstructed.

RECOMMENDATION – M 2

Transform streets into attractive and functional multimodal assets.

STRATEGY - M 2.1

Integrate green stormwater infrastructure and street trees into street reconstruction and traffic calming projects.

STRATEGY - M 2.2

Add crossing Improvements for people accessing transit, trailheads, and schools.

STRATEGY - M 2.3

Improve walkability and multimodal accessibility of industrial sites and freight hubs to ensure access for the workforce in these areas.

RECOMMENDATION – M 3

Support future growth with a connected transportation

STRATEGY - M 3.1

Reconnect neighborhoods through pedestrian-scale improvements at key highway and arterial intersections.







Why You're Here

- Key role in your community
- Unique and diverse perspectives
- Representative for geographic area and/or organizations within the Project Area
- Common goal: make your area the best place to live, work and play!



Roles and Responsibilities

- Support the implementation of the SA Tomorrow Comprehensive Plan
- Provide advice and guidance on the planning process
- Provide input and feedback on draft products
- Serve as an ambassador for the SA Tomorrow Sub-Area project
- Summarize input and feedback from others, for the Planning Team
- Contribute to at least one formal outreach event
- Distribute information through your community/organization

Rules of Decorum

- Meetings begin and end at announced times
- Unanticipated alternative topics typically wait for the next meeting
- Open for public attendance but designed as a work session
- Basic **Principles**:


