I. MEETING PURPOSE & AGENDA

The purpose of this meeting was to discuss the first draft of the Vision & Goals statement, introduction to land use and discuss the concept of Focus Areas. The agenda for the meeting included:

II. SUMMARY MEETING

The meeting began with a round of staff introductions and a recap of the Plan timeline. We then highlighted the key discussion topics from Planning Team Meeting #1 and Community Meeting #1. After presenting the main themes to the planning team, our project consultant Jay Renkens overviewed the preliminary draft of the Vision and Goals. Following the Vision and Goals discussion, Jay introduced land use, followed by the introduction of focus areas and the planning team was encouraged to discuss potential focus areas within the community area boundary.

VISION AND GOALS DISCUSSION

The planning team provided feedback on the current draft of the vision and goals for the community area. Overall, the group felt that the content should be more visionary and tailored, as the existing language seemed too general and could apply to many areas across the city. Planning team members

emphasized the importance of crafting a vision that reflects the unique identity, opportunities, and challenges of this specific community. Key themes from the discussion included:


- Mobility and Infrastructure
 - There was a strong emphasis on the need for expanded mobility options, particularly walking, biking, and public transit. The group stressed the importance of investing in safe and accessible bike and pedestrian infrastructure to ensure that people of all ages and abilities can move around easily and safely.
- Third Places and Community Spaces
 The team highlighted the need for more third places—informal gathering spaces beyond home
 and work/school—especially those that serve students, families, and young people. These local
 spaces reduce the need for residents to travel far and can strengthen community ties.
- Public Art and Cultural Identity
 The area was described as an "art desert", with limited access to public or community art. The group expressed interest in exploring ways to identify local artists from within the community and collaborate with nonprofits and city partners to bring more public art to the area. This could help foster local pride and identity.
- Leveraging Anchor Institutions
 The team discussed the strategic importance of St. Mary's University as a major anchor institution in the area. There was interest in exploring how the university could play a larger role in supporting community goals through partnerships, programming, or physical improvements that benefit surrounding neighborhoods. Below are comments from the vision and goals discussion.

Vision comments:

- Replace "maintains" with "enhances"
- Replace "protects" with "celebrates"

Goals comments:

- There are unique homes in the NNW area, we should celebrate and encourage it
- Goals should be more visionary; the language now can apply to any area
- There should be a focus on non-vehicular options (walking, biking, public transit)
- There is an "art desert" in the NNW area; emphasize a need for more art
- Related to Goal #2: "Lots of creeks in the area add connections"
- Related to Goal #3: "Emphasize third spaces, especially for students, parents, families, young people"
- Related to Goal #5: "Connection for elderly too"
- Related to Goal #6: "St. Mary's University should be named at the institution to partner with"




FOCUS AREAS IDENTIFICATION & DISCUSSION

Beginning the Focus Areas discussion, Jay Renkens, project consultant described what focus areas are and what they could include. The project manager described potential Focus Areas are areas of opportunity to direct future investments, support, or improvements. Support for focus areas could also include preservation. When analyzing potential focus areas, staff will study vacant or underutilized parcels, commercial strips, former industrial sites, areas along transit corridors, major intersections or nodes and special districts that may need investment or support.

The Planning Team was shown a map of the area with vacant sites, underutilized sites, publicly owned land and business closed during 2018 - 2023. The opportunity 1 sites are ones that have both a low floor area to land area ration and low improvement value to land value ratio. Opportunity 2 sites are ones with just low floor area to land area ratio (FAR less than or equal to 0.2). And opportunity 3 sites are low improvement value to land value ratio (building coverage is less than 0.5 of the entire parcel). The last category is Publicly Owned, are sites that are publicly owned but would be attractive for development. This means they do not currently have a major use or purpose, are undeveloped or underdeveloped.

The planning team generally agreed with the focus areas identified by planning staff and provided thoughtful feedback on how they might be refined:

- The group suggested combining Focus Areas F and G, noting that they are in close proximity
 along Ingram Road and Callaghan Road, and could be addressed together as a single area of
 opportunity or concern.
- There was consensus that Focus Area E could be removed, as the entrance to the Southwest Research Institute at Culebra Road and Oak Hill Road is already clearly identified and does not require further focus within this planning process.
- The team proposed relocating Focus Area D to the intersection of W. Woodlawn and Bandera Road, which was described as a problematic and unsafe area for both vehicular and pedestrian traffic. They emphasized the need for improvements to traffic flow, safety, and multimodal access at this location.
- Additionally, the group shared that some residents are actively working toward the creation of a
 new park behind the Cielo Vista movie theater. The proposed park will be named Cielo Vista
 Park. While details are still emerging, the group expressed interest in integrating this future
 amenity into the broader planning effort. Design and construction updates are expected to
 develop alongside the planning process.
